THE VICAR WRITES . . .

Dear Christ Church,

Fifteen years and more have simply flown by. It's an odd sensation, but it feels like hardly any time has elapsed since Sue and I, Frank, Jonah and George arrived in July 2003. Yet here I am, well over fifteen years later, sitting down to write in this one hundred and fifty-sixth 'Outreach' of our time here.

It's tempting to blow the dust off diaries and review the past. But faith is a forward-looking thing. The slaves under Moses, set free from their Egyptian yoke, sometimes yielded to the temptation to view the past through rose-tinted spectacles. They did this even though in Egypt they cried out to God under the lash of their slave-drivers. Moses had to keep re-focusing God's people on the *future* – the sometimes-perilous journey through the wilderness to the Promised Land.

In this forward-looking focus *faith* is the twin of *hope*. Hope, too, is a way of thinking that moves expectantly forward into the future. Our Lent Course for 2019 has as a memory verse Jeremiah 29.11...

'For I know the plans I have for you,' declares the LORD, 'plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future'.

So let me sign off this fifteen year series of Outreach letters with some personal hopes for the future of Christ Church.

Firstly let me hope that the period of vacancy you are about to enter will be a seed-time of growth. This is already beginning to happen. Andrew Judge has kindly offered to convene the Clergy/Readers group and David Laszlo to convene the Worship Committee. Tina Benney, Chris Eddershaw and Anne Chapman have kindly offered to hold the Pastoral Team together. Angela Smith has agreed to co-ordinate baptism bookings, and Carolyn Franks is joining the home communion team she shadowed me recently and it was her first experience of a home communion visit. Please pray for everyone I've named, alongside everyone else continuing ministry already established.

Secondly let me hope that Christ Church's worshipping life remains inclusive of the gifts of a wide range of people. In 2003 I inherited a tense stand-off between choir and worship group. I'm delighted that this now feels like ancient history. May choir under Tim, group under Beck

and all the complementary voices in our preaching team continue to cook up a rich casserole honouring to God.

Thirdly let me hope that the appointments process to begin shortly after our departure will lead – in God's good time – to the right appointment of the right woman or man to act as your next vicar. They will undoubtedly bring gifts and skills I don't have – not least in the area of developing the building. It's a matter of regret to me that we haven't been able to make more progress on the reordering project. I continue to pray that all the time and energy that has gone into this conversation will yield a building fit for purpose in the twenty-first century.

Finally let me hope that Christ Church becomes/remains a place where many men, women and children who don't yet know God might be drawn to living faith. I try to root everything I do in the fathomless love of God for God's creation. May you, and many like you, come to know how wide and long and high and deep is the love of Christ, and to know this love that surpasses knowledge.

FROM SUE MAYFIELD...

Dear Christ Church,

I wanted to share some thoughts as Tim and I prepare to leave Cheltenham after nearly 16 years and the process of sorting, decluttering and packing our things gets underway in earnest. Moving prompts looking both backwards and forwards and brings many mixed emotions.

We arrived in Cheltenham during the baking hot summer of 2003 with three loud and lively sons – Frank (then 15), Jonah (then 13) and George (then 11) and a border collie (Moss) in his prime. We leave as a couple of dogless fifty-something empty nesters for what will likely be our last job before retirement. How did that happen?!

It's certainly been a rich and rewarding period of our lives and we've loved living in Cheltenham. I've especially enjoyed the Festivals, the lido and walking in the Cotswolds (which we've done most Fridays). I value the many friends we've made and all we've travelled through together. It's been a time of change and development for me in my professional life. I arrived as a writer of children's books, moved into work using writing as a tool for wellbeing and then re-trained as a Counsellor and Psychotherapist. For the last five years I've been practising from a lovely room in Tivoli, and also at Maggie's Centre, helping people talk and write about their lives. I hope to do similar work in the North East and look forward to new opportunities unfolding there in due course.

As many of you know my elderly parents are in the North East. Dad has been poorly for the last couple of years and I'm looking forward to being able to offer more practical support to him and Mam. Earsdon, the village where we will be living (pronounced 'Urs-dun') is just 10 minutes away - an improvement on a six hour journey time! I'm also looking forward to being by the sea, getting another dog and rediscovering a part of the world that was home until I left aged 18.

But as well as all the things I'm looking forward to there are many sadnesses in moving on and much that I will miss. I will greatly miss being part of the church family here at Christ Church. I love our music, the depth and intelligence of the preaching and communal praying and the friendly hospitality that is a Christ Church hallmark. There have been many changes in our church life during our time here. New people have arrived and dear people have moved on or died. It's been a privilege to share in joys and sorrows, to celebrate all that's gone well, puzzle over

things that have foundered or not come to fruition and seek God's face as we move forward together. A highlight for me has been being part of the Youth and Children's team, co-leading the 14+ group Living Room for seven years, first with our former curate Linda Flewker Barker and then with Mandy and Phil Whitefield, and working with Pathfinders (our 11-14 year olds) for long enough to see babies grow into remarkable young adults! I've loved the energy and curiosity of our young people as they grapple with following Jesus in a complex and fascinating world.

I've got many good memories of church life here — exquisite Christmas services, hilarity and shared meals at Parish weekends, hymn singing at the bandstand in Montpellier Park, 'Soul Space' quiet days and Lent groups - as well as the weekly rhythm of meeting for worship and breaking bread together. I've enjoyed initiating and being part of creative projects such as making the *Tree of Life* batik that hangs in the Harwood Hall, the *All Are Welcome* wooden spoon puppets we made of ourselves back in 2009 and the Holy Week Film Festival we had at the Vicarage in 2008. Thanks for your willingness to join in and be inventive and adventurous in thinking and speaking about faith.



LENT COURSE 2019 – THE PROPHECY OF JEREMIAH

God bless you as you journey through Lent with Jeremiah. In the second session of the course, God prompts Jeremiah to go and watch a potter at work... Then the word of the LORD came to me. He said, 'Can I not do with you, Israel, as this potter does?' declares the LORD. 'Like clay in the hand of the potter, so are you in my hand... May God the divine potter mould and shape you in His love, both individually as a faith-community.

FAITH: FINDING A NEW SHAPE FOR YOUR LIFE

Through the five weeks of Lent, the Diocese of Gloucester is inviting everyone to explore how faith influences what we do every day. Each week will have a different theme - relating, praying, working, playing and growing and the aim is to help us get our lives back in balance.

There are resources for people who want to look at deepening their faith with their church. There are fun activities, reflections and prayers for every week for families and for our schools. Bishop Rachel has made a series of videos about each week to help guide you through the themes.

The first week's focus is on how we relate to others and talks about welcome and hospitality. "Where would you go if you needed help? If you needed somewhere to stay or a hot dinner? Back in medieval times everyone knew that if they ran into problems and had nowhere to stay or nothing to eat, they could go to the monks at the monastery who would always give them food and shelter for a day and night. It was part of the shape of their life that they wouldn't turn anyone away and said, 'Let everyone be welcomed as Christ'. They would bow their heads to people as a sign that they recognised the presence of God in them. How would you like to be welcomed, especially somewhere new? How do you welcome people to your home, school, uniformed organisations, music group, or Friendship Club? Are there ways you can think of helping people who need somewhere to stay or some food, to feel welcome?"

This is achieved through debt support, as well as delivering the CAP Money Course to tackle some of the root causes of poverty. They are "committed to stepping into the most desperate situations as a beacon of God's light and showing his heart for the poor and needy". CAP invite regular givers, who they fittingly call "Life Changers".

Last year Christ Church donated £1,000 to CAP as part of our annual budget spending. This year that isn't possible so events like this are really important to show our support for CAP's work.

EARTH HOUR

Saturday 30th March: 8.30pm – 9.30pm

For the past 10 years, people around the world have come together every Earth Hour to support efforts to tackle climate change. This has created a powerful movement that helped deliver strong global commitments to tackling this threat. Climate change remains a big challenge for us all. But another urgent threat now demands our attention: the loss of nature. These two combined threats mean we must act - and now.

Starting as a symbolic lights out event in Sydney in 2007, WWF's Earth Hour has grown to become the world's largest grassroots movement for the environment, inspiring individuals, communities, businesses and organisations in more than 180 countries and territories to take action for our shared home.

As a church, we will be participating in Earth Hour by switching off the church floodlights for an hour. We will be joining similar switch-off events on major public buildings in the UK and around the world, including Buckingham Palace, Canterbury Cathedral, the Eiffel Tower, Sydney Opera House and many others. We encourage members of the congregation to do the same at home. We have registered our participation as a switch-off event at <u>earthhour.org</u>.

WORLD MISSION COMMITTEE NEWS

Historically, the PCC had the aim of providing 10% of its general income (tithing your donations & collections) and 100% of the Summer Fete, towards World Mission - the spreading of God's Love and Good News. Due to the economic pressures of rising costs and the down turn in giving to Christ Church this amount has had to be reduced – last year we received 8.5% of the collections plus £1,000 earmarked for CAP (Christians Against Poverty) as well as the profit of the fete. The budget for this year allocates just 5% of income plus the money raised by the fete. CAP is to be supported by a special fundraiser this year, see page 11.

We are extremely grateful to everyone who puts so much effort into the Summer Fete. We are relying on this money to enable us to continue to support the vital work of our mission partners and contribute to charities making a difference to people at home and abroad.

The report for the Annual Parish Church Meeting will include a full list of the charities and missions we have supported financially in 2018.

OUR MISSION PARTNERS:

Corrie Verduyn CMS (Church Mission Society) – Corrie visited us last February. She expressed her gratitude for our continued financial backing and especially for our love and prayers. She told us about the continued challenges for the Hospital and district and that she needed some prayers for decisions she was facing regarding her own future. She has now informed us that her time at the Hospital in Kiwoko, Uganda will be ending in March 2019. Her Mission there has been a great success and she will be leaving with the hospital in good hands. The difference she has made to the provision of medical support for women's health, in particular, has been immense. We shall therefore be finishing our financial support for Corrie in April.

Philbert Kalisa – REACH (Reconciliation, Education and Christian Healing) for Rwanda. Philbert was moved to create this movement in the aftermath of the genocide in Rwanda in the 1990s. He sent us an email recently thanking us for our prayers and long term support. He explained how the work of REACH has been blessed over the last 20

years. They have been able to train over 30,000 people for healing and reconciliation, over 9,000 have been genuinely reconciled and over 2,000 are working in various unity groups through joint projects. He explained that they have built a centre for Unity and Peace to host training events and workshops — a youth community development centre that is used by REACH members from different denominations together. REACH for Rwanda UK has now closed as the main goal has largely been achieved.

REACH is now getting involved with community development and discipleship. Philbert told us: "The Rwandan people now need development in all aspects – spiritual, social-economic and leadership. Such development goes hand in hand with peacebuilding and sustainability.

We are now focussing on a new programme - Gender equity, equality and reconciliation, helping families to understand that God created both men and women equal. Helping reconciled communities to form unity groups and cooperatives in order to come up with different projects that help them to fight poverty and promote social justice and sustainability. You are most welcome to partner with us and we thank you for the long partnership and support that Christ Church has been providing over the years."

As a result of the UK closure The World Mission Committee is currently reassessing the terms of our relationship with Philbert and REACH. The long-term challenges of such historical and cultural differences can threaten peace and cause hatred and division to reappear. It would be very helpful to have your prayers so that we can do God's Will on this issue.

Joss Downey, Mission Without Borders – Joss visited us in October. He described how the money given to MWB makes a difference in the poorest area of Europe. After the break up of the Soviet Union the Russians removed all the industrial infrastructure and took everything of value, leaving Moldova destitute. MWB is supporting families – to help fight the causes of people trafficking and the exploitation of vulnerable young girls.

MWB runs an annual programme called Operation Christmas Life, OCL, which comprises delivering vitally needed food and supply packages to poor and vulnerable families.

Wendy, at Matilda Project in Zimbabwe, is working with orphans of HIVAIDS. Here are some headlines from the October newsletter: 30,000 per year still dying of HIV AIDS. Orphans are still being made. The economy is still a challenge with spiralling inflation and political unrest. A cholera outbreak also a concern. The school breakfasts have been able to continue despite this. Medicines have been scarce – even paracetamol.

Due to the political unrest Wendy has asked us to be careful not to name the Matilda Project operatives online. 11 villages now have support groups set up supporting 216 members with monthly meetings to help them to take their medications, making and selling crafts from local materials. Food packs are being funded in smaller allocations to try to cope with the financial situation. It costs 15,000 Zimbabwe dollars to fund 40 secondary level students, 594 for 36 primary students (those that don't even have grandparents).

BBC TO RUN A 'YEAR OF BELIEFS'

The move comes a year after the BBC promised to raise its game in the way that it treated religion. That promise followed a year-long review of its religious and ethics output.


Here are some examples of what is planned.

On BBC 2, *Inside the Vatican* will show a year in the life of the Vatican community, including Pope Francis; and the popular *Pilgrimage* series will return.

The Bishop of Repton, the Rt. Revd. Jan McFarlane, who chairs the Sandford St Martin Trust, welcomed the BBC's plans. Especially "bringing issues of faith, belief and ethics to as wide an audience as possible."
